They are former authors of Villager articles and current chairs of the social committee, just two examples of this fact. Sue Oberg, CWGA President in 2006, (photo below) has been a member of CWGA for 25 years and has held 48 different positions. Sue still contributes as one of the leaders of Communications and Website. Many of the 12 past presidents still currently lead and serve CWGA on other committees. We honor and recognize our past and current president for stepping up to lead CWGA with vision, energy, persistence, and a willingness to honor the past. while making changes that moves CWGA on a path toward a premier women's golf club!"
